CONFLICTED ALLEGIANCE

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1. DEFINING OUR TERMS

- Pledge: a promise
- Allegiance: something you're willing to give everything to
- Privilege: the ability to walk to away from the plight of those on the underside of power
- **Politics of Jesus:** Ordering society in light of the kingdom of God
- **Cross & Country:** Idolatrous Nationalism. "Good of empire = Good of God's Kingdom"
- Apolitical and Isolated: Insular, privileged and apolitical church
- **Conflicted Allegiance:** Pledging our allegiance to the Kingdom of God while leveraging our nation-state citizenship on behalf of those on the underside of power
 - Living in an empire while being faithful to the kingdom of God
 - Fidelity to the kingdom, not to a party

2. QUESTIONS FOR PERSONAL EXAMINATION

- How has your inherited privilege and proximity to power informed how you read the Bible and interpret it's story?
- Reflect on your upbringing. Did the *Cross and Country* or *Apolitical and Isolated* paradigm most speak to the way you were taught to engage the nation-state as a Christian? Why and in what ways?
- When you think of the 2020 Presidential Election season, what emotions or feelings come to the surface for you?
- Do you feel good about the time, energy and emotion you currently put into engaging the United States political process? If so, why? If not, what needs to change?
- How might you model holding deep convictions in a generous way with family, friends and you congregation throughout election season?
- As you pledge allegiance to the kingdom of God, how might you leverage your vote for someone you know on the underside of power?
